What is health communication?

According to the Centers for Disease Control, Health Communication "is the study and use of communication strategies to inform and influence decisions and actions to improve health."

Traditional models of producing health education material (developed between 1940-1990) were found to be insufficient in driving health behavior. Although people understood the behavior that caused disease, that behavior was not changed.

Message alone was not enough.

Those involved in delivering health information began aggressively turning to communication scholars to help. Healthcare professionals even sought advanced degrees in the communication arts and sciences. By the late 1970s the National Communication Association recognized the health communication as a discipline. It is now the largest and fastest growing interest group of the organization.




